From a gastronomic tour of the Vendée to a luxury spa break in Aquitaine, our France expert picks her favourite breaks

Best for foodies

1. Gastronomic Lyon

With Eurostar's new direct route to Lyon opening on May 1, and with journey times at just over four and a half hours, it's time to book the train from St Pancras International for a foray to France's foodiest city. Star chef Paul Bocuse has several restaurants here: the three-Michelin-starred L'Auberge du Pont de Collonges, as well as four brasseries — Le Nord, Le Sud, L'Est and L'Ouest — each offering a different dining experience. Also try the city's famous bouchon restaurants: these traditional taverns serve typical Lyonnaise cuisine, where carnivores will delight in the meaty menus. Stay at Cour des Loges (0033 457 747 474, courdesloges.com), a hotel with its own Michelin-starred restaurant.

2. Cookery break in Normandy

The fairytale Château de Saint Paterne in Alençon in Normandy is introducing new cookery-and-sightseeing breaks for this spring and autumn. The charming 15th-century château was once the romantic bolt hole for the French King Henri IV, and is now the family estate of chef Charles-Henry de Valbray, who has taken 20 years to restore it to a sensational standard. This six-day, five-night stay includes two cookery courses, visits to Second World War sites near Caen, a trip to the Loire Valley, with wine tastings, market and village visits as well as time to enjoy Charles-Henry and his wife Ségolène's heart-warming hospitality.

3. Cycle through Alsace

What better way to work up an appetite for Alsace's hearty cuisine than a cycling tour through the region's verdant vineyards? Cycling for Softies' new seven-night gastronomic itinerary will have you pedalling along the gentle cycle paths by the river Rhine, exploring medieval villages, enjoying wine-tastings in vineyards, and eating meals in Michelin-starred restaurants. Stay in four-star hotels in Kaysersberg, Oberbergen and Sélestat.

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4. Languedoc wines

Raise a toast with the finest wines in the Languedoc-Roussillon region under the expert guidance of top wine journalist Andrew Jefford. Wine tour company Arblaster and Clarke's new trip for 2015 will get you an early dose of southern French sunshine as you travel around the area staying in three and four-star hotels and sampling the corbières, minervois, Pic St Loup, St Chinian and La Clape wines.

5. Foodie Vendée

Le Manoir du Moulin, a luxury B&B in the Vendée, has a bounty of foodie experiences on offer for 2015. Try its "chef experience" and learn from the top local chefs who are invited to demonstrate their knowhow in front of groups of four to six while they prepare a gastronomic three-course meal. Or check into the new gîte — opening spring 2015, sleeping up to six — and relax in the beautiful grounds while a gourmet barbecue is prepared.

6. Bordeaux vineyards

Gastronomes are in for a treat if they check into Château Cordeillan-Bages for its two-night kitchen discovery package. The Relais & Châteaux property nestles among vineyards near the Gironde estuary north of Bordeaux. It is the domaine of two-Michelin-star chef Jean-Luc Rocha, who has also just been awarded a fourth chef's hat by the Gault & Millau 2015 restaurant guide (five is the top). Rocha will give you an exclusive peek behind the scenes of his kitchen and let you into the secrets of his world-class cuisine with a special mini-demonstration. The two-night stay includes a tour of the château's wine-making facilities, followed by an introductory wine-making course at Cercle Lynch-Bages.

7. Wine hotel in Languedoc-Roussillon

Wine lovers will adore a stay at Hotel Riberach in Bélesta in Languedoc-Roussillon. This former wine cooperative has been transformed into a chic hotel-cum-wine cellar by its architect owners, with industrial-style decor, fantastic views and many of the bedrooms in the former wine cellars. Its restaurant is run by Laurent Lemal, who was a runner-up in the prestigious competition Meilleur Ouvrier de France.

Best new places to stay

8. Provence vineyard

The Clos de l'Ours guesthouse, set in the heart of a vineyard close to the Gorges du Verdon, only opened last summer, but has already gained many fans. Furnished in a modern style with a mix of natural materials, its rooms are spacious and each enjoys wonderful views of the vines and surrounding countryside. Fabienne and Michel Brotons are welcoming hosts, and the domaine is the perfect place to switch off from the world.

9 Loire manor

Winner of the 2014 Alastair Sawday's award for best self-catering property, the Clos des Capucins manor house is a great place for a family get-together, with some good additions for wine lovers. Surrounded by gardens and a 1.5-hectare biodynamic vineyard run by Fiona Beeston, the wine journalist and author, the property sleeps up to ten people and has spectacular views of Château de Chinon, which was once the residence of King Henry II and Eleanor of Aquitaine.

10. Grand dame of Paris

Later this year, the Hôtel de Crillon, one of the grandes dames of the French hotel world, is reopening after a chic two-year renovation. The highlight is that Karl Lagerfeld has been called upon to bring his signature style to the historic hotel, built in 1758, by designing two suites. Now part of the Rosewood Hotels and Resorts group, the Hôtel de Crillon was built as a private residence at King Louis XV's behest and first opened as a hotel in 1909. Also reopening next year is the Ritz, after a chic two-year renovation

11. Sofitel Paris

For those whose budget won't quite stretch to the Crillon or the Ritz, the newly refurbished Sofitel in the fashionable Faubourg St Honoré district of Paris, has chic style without the price tag. The 147 new-look bedrooms, lobby and bars — the creation of top interior designer Didier Gomez — opened late last year, and the restaurant will launch in early March.

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12. Chic stay in Arles

This hotel opened quietly in 2014 after being revamped by Christian Lacroix, who is from Arles. It's in a former 17th-century convent, with 52 rooms, a gourmet restaurant and a heated pool by cloistered gardens. The style is flamboyant, with bold patterned wallpaper and striking colours.

13. Midi-Pyrenees lodges

This new holiday village in the heart of the Midi-Pyrenees region aims to offer high-end luxury that is also eco-friendly. Opening in April, its six four-star lodges will offer a kitchen-cum-living area, two en-suite bedrooms and a terrace, making it ideal for family holidays. On the rest of the site, there is a spa and a heated pool, fitness room, children's play areas and numerous activities. Book now for a 30 per cent reduction on weekly stays.

14. Montpellier spa

With the recent addition of a second swimming pool and newly expanded spa area, the stylish Domaine de Verchant just outside Montpellier makes for a great city-break destination, where relaxation is on the menu, too. Taste the estate's own wines, stroll around the gardens or use the spa where there is a hammam, indoor heated pool and treatments available. Couples can book the private area and have the steam room, balneotherapy bath and terrace to themselves.

15. Burgundy boat houses

The latest glamping trend is the Toue cabanée, a kind of gypsy caravan on water. These distinctive wooden boats originated in the Loire valley in the 17th century and now make a great base for those who fancy a few nights on gentle waterways throughout France. One of their newest locations is on the Burgundy-Auvergne border, where 12 boats have become a Village Toue, at the Domaine des Demoiselles.

Best for families

16. Stay at the zoo, Maine-et-Loire

At Zoo de la Flèche, between Angers and Le Mans, the specially created luxury lodges have windows looking directly into the animals' enclosures. Choose between a night with wolves, white tiger, lemurs or, new for 2015, a villa next to the polar bears' pool. The lodges and villas are beautifully decorated, and evening meals are provided.

17. Château in Provence

Let your children indulge their fairytale fantasies by staying at your very own château. The tower has a brand new kids' dormitory and crash pad, packed with books and toys for keeping the little ones entertained while parents relax. The imposing 16th-century Château Aubenas is based near the pretty medieval village of Forcalquier.

18. Farm fun in Lorraine

The family of rustic glamping sites known as Featherdown Farm (or its French name, Un Lit au Pré — a bed in a meadow) has a new site in the eastern region of Lorraine. At Le Domaine du Cloître Saint-Christophe, you will be sleeping in a spacious, well-equipped tent warmed by a wood-burning stove. The site is in a medieval monastery dating from 707, at the heart of a forest close to the River Meuse. The Dutch hosts, Savine and Pieter Priester, run a stud farm and breed beautiful Friesian horses that you can ride.

Best for camping

23. Burgundy Hobbit house

At the Domaine de la Pierre Ronde, a glamping site with treehouses, yurts, teepees and gypsy caravans in the heart of the Morvan natural park, a French couple have recreated Tolkien's vision for Bilbo Baggins's lodgings. Under a grassy knoll, it comes complete with round red door, stone walls and a tree trunk in the centre, and sleeps four. Sheepskins and blankets add to the cosiness, making it a great bolthole after expeditions through Middle-earth. There are mountain bikes, fishing and boating and donkeys to ride.

24. Camp in Brittany

Check into Eurocamp's new Avant holiday home accommodation at the Domaine des Ormes and you will never want to camp in a tent again. 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45. Celebrate Agincourt

This year is the time to mark hundreds of years of Anglo-French rivalry with both the 200th anniversary of Waterloo and the 600th anniversary of the Battle of Agincourt. For the latter, the weekend of July 25-26 will see an attempt to break the world record for an arrow storm with 1,000 archers firing simultaneously, as well as a re-enactment at the Azincourt (as it's called in French) site.

46. Opera at Aix

With Eurostar opening a direct route to Marseille, it will be an easy hop to Aix-en-Provence to enjoy the festival, which won the festival of the year award at the International Opera Awards 2014. Enjoy warm evenings watching world-class opera performances in the courtyard of the Archbishop's Palace, and take walking tours to see the city's 17th-century architecture, and the Cézanne collections at the Musée Granet.

47. Rouen city break

48. Cave art in Ardeche

The Chauvet-Pont-d'Arc cave finally opens in the Ardèche this April after several delays and, through a replica version a short distance from the original site, the world will finally see what the best preserved figurative cave paintings in the world really look like. Discovered in 1994, the hundreds of depictions of animals including cave lions, bears and panthers, date from 30,000 to 32,000 years ago.

49. Huguenot haunts, Cévennes

The Huguenots were members of the French Protestant church who were persecuted for their faith in the 16th century. ACE Cultural Tours has a new seven-night tour that covers areas important to their history, starting in Orange and going on to the beautiful Cévennes mountains. The tour finishes at the annual gathering of Huguenot descendants.

50. Van Gogh in Arles

View the scenes that so inspired Vincent van Gogh around the Roman town of Arles in Provence, with the help of a signposted walk. Ten panels show where he set up his easel during his stay in the town during 1888 and 1889. Also in Arles is the new Van Gogh foundation museum, which exhibits work by contemporary artists. Stay at the newly renovated Hôtel Jules Cesar, designed by Christian Lacroix.
